For your interest, each model is priced at £21.99.







Dear Emma,

Many thanks for your letter. I was disappointed that you have decided not to go with my scarecrows – but not as disappointed as they will be when I tell them!

You kindly mentioned that I should bear you in mind with any new products I may have. Well, I have recently been working on a new design, which I refer to as *The Taupendulator*, (drawings enclosed).

Like my scarecrows, *The Taupendulator* is designed to ward off garden birds and gulls. It's once again based on Roman themes, and you'll notice that it hearkens back to the days of Cassius, Dementicles and Julius of Thane.


The principle of *The Taupendulator* is quite simple. The product sits in the flower bed or vegetable patch, held down with rope. The opening is filled with a syrup (based on my own recipe – a mixture of camphor, petrol, iodine and cream) and left to stand for 24 hours. After this period, birds become naturally attracted to the odour, and fly in to investigate.

The Taupendulator works in a similar way to the Venus Fly Trap. Birds which rest on the 'lip' of the device trigger a set of springs inside, causing the 'mouth' of the product to clamp shut on the bird. The bird is then totally immersed in the syrup, which acts much like any quick-setting glue. Within 10-15 minutes the bird is completely immobilised, and can be disposed of (bag supplied).

I am sure *The Taupendulator* is something that would fit nicely in your excellent garden catalogue, and feel confident it could really catch on. I hope you enjoy my designs, and look forward to hearing from you.
