## Art on Sundays

If you happen to be in the city on the first Sunday in the month, you'll be lucky enough to catch Domenical Museo when all the state museums offer free admission – from the Uffizi Gallery and Medici Chapels to the Galleria dell'Accademia with Michelangelo's David (photo) → p. 33

## City tour with bus No C3

The electric minibus C3 drives through the narrow streets of old Florence, past the Piazza Pitti and Piazza Santa Croce and crosses the Arno several times a day. This makes it the cheapest city tour - not completely free of course, but for a mere 1.20 euros > p. 123

### A break at the library

You can sit virtually undisturbed under the arcades of the cloisters at the Biblioteca delle Oblate. Brunelleschi's dome is so close you could almost touch it, and there's a play area for the kids. The setting costs nothing, so you can treat yourself to a cappuccino and a brioche  $\rightarrow p$ . 50

## Open air sculpture gallery

Perhaps the finest Florentine sculpture gallery stands out in the open, and there's not even an admission charge. At the Loggia dei Lanzi, you are surrounded by works by great artists such as Giambologna, Michelangelo or Donatello → p. 34

### Fantastic view

Bus route 12 takes you up the long winding road lined with trees to Piazzale Michelangelo where a replica of Michelangelo's David is standing. Take in the breath-taking panoramic view of the city and the Arno valley below for free

### Fuochi di San Giovanni

Since the 14th century. Florence has celebrated its patron saint on 24 June. To mark the occasion, the city puts on a fabulous firework display for its residents and guests below the Piazzale Michelangelo  $\rightarrow$  p. 114



try a cup of their delicious hot chocolate which is famous throughout Italy! This vast piazza belongs to one of the most inspiring sights in Florence along with the Palazzo Vecchio  $\rightarrow$  p. 37 and the Loggia dei Lanzi  $\rightarrow$  p. 34.

Now take a stroll along the Via dei Calzaiuoli, take a left at the former granary and church adorned with sculptures 2 Orsanmichele  $\rightarrow$  p. 35, and wander across the Piazza della Repubblica where you can buy a foreign-language newspaper at the kiosk under the triumphal arch.
