

INSIDER TIP Smelling salts...

To see the spectacular natural wonder of the Cliffs of Moher (up to 656 ft high) from the boat is a particularly intense experience. An added bonus of this trip, buffeted by the waves of the Atlantic: you can observe puffins and other sea birds nesting at other inaccessible sites \rightarrow p. 76

INSIDER TIP Teatime in the park

Lunch or afternoon tea at Muckross Garden Restaurant in Killarney: the large terrace with views of the old greenhouses and the Victorian landscaped park of the manor house is unique → p. 60

INSIDER IIP Peninsula in the rough Atlantic

At some 60 miles, the *Ring of Beara* is a great alternative to the better-known (and oh, so busy) Ring of Kerry; also, the Beara Peninsula boasts lush vegetation and a dramatic coastline \rightarrow p. 62

INSIDER IIP A pub in the far west

Small, unpretentious and famous with all fans of Irish folk: the owner of the *Matt Molloy's* pub in Westport is Matt Molloy, no less, who's been playing the flute with the Irish band The Chieftains for over 30 years → p. 78

INSIDER IIP Over Dublin's rooftops

Croke Park stadium is not just for playing football – the Skyline tours take you up onto and around its $roof \rightarrow p.36$

INSIDER IIP B & B in the castle

The classiest B&B in all of Ireland, without a doubt: reside between antiques in the wings of historic Bantry House – some rooms even have a view of Bantry Bay (photo right) → p. 55

INSIDER TIP And the eagle flies...

In Eagles Flying in County Sligo, you can experience up close birds of prey in flight \rightarrow p. 83

INSIDER IIP Look to the stars

Once used to determine the temperature of the moon, this ancient telescope is still working perfectly – get a closer look at Birr Castle → p. 92

INSIDER TIP Shopping in the manor house

Jams in Victorian terracotta pots, sugar rock in luminous colours: the products for sale at the *Avoca Store* in Powerscourt House are a visual treat → p. 45

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Ormond Castle

Ireland's rough beauty

To experience the wild side of Ireland, head for the Aran Islands off the west coast. Discover *Dun Aengus*, an Iron Age fort perched on the edge of a cliff above the Atlantic, buffeted by the wind for over 2,500 years now (photo) \Rightarrow p. 74

Pubs: places of inspiration

Ireland's greatest writers had a stool with their name on it, and Irish musicians played their first gig in pubs. The *Dublin Literary Pub Crawl* and the *Musical Pub Crawl* through the nightlife hub of Temple Bar allows you to follow in their footsteps \Rightarrow p. 41

Celtic high crosses

Come real close to Celtic spirituality: the high crosses standing in the grounds of the ruined monastery of *Monasterboice* are the highest — at over 6 m/19.7 ft — and arguably the most beautiful in all of Ireland → p. 44

Gone to the dogs

At the dog races, at the *Greyhound Stadium* in Cork for instance, you sit next to betting harbour labourers and fishermen, students and housewives. Cheer on the greyhounds with them, and indulge in the passion of the common man, which today runs through all social levels \rightarrow p. 57

Folk music with country folk

Every year in August, folk music lovers meet at the *Fleadh Cheoil na hEireann*. Do as the Irish fans do: make music and have a dance at the many small festivals in villages and small towns \rightarrow p. 116

Garden delights

For two weeks in June, garden owners who have come together under the *West Cork Garden Trail* umbrella open their gates, giving insights into the fantastical world of wild flowers, orchids, rhododendrons, tropical trees and Himalayan cedars → p. 58

Round tower in the ruined monastery

Mystical Ireland: to admire the most beautiful of the country's nearly millennial freestanding round towers, head for *Glendalough*. The tower belongs to the crumbling monastic settlement of the same name, one of the most mysterious places in the country $\rightarrow p$. 44
