Discover new places and save money

A garden to die for

The *Quinta Splendida* hotel in Caniço has a wonderful garden in which many plants are labelled. Hotel guests as well as the general public can enjoy its beauty and the ocean view (photo) \rightarrow p. 46

Live like Asterix

The village of *Santana* is reminiscent of a Gallic settlement with its red doors, blue-framed windows with green shutters and drooping thatched roofs. The historic houses make the past come alive – like a trip to a museum, but for free \rightarrow p. 63

Learn about what creeps, crawls and swims around Madeira

There is usually an entrance fee to see the exhibits on Madeira's flora, fauna and geology at the *Museu de História Natural*. But, on Sundays, you can visit the museum and the aquarium for free \rightarrow p. 37

A fortress with a view

The climb up to the *Fortaleza do Pico de São João* is steep, but well worth it! Not only is a visit to this over 400 year-old fortress free, you can also enjoy a fantastic view of Funchal and the Atlantic from the walls of the Pico dos Frias which sits at a height of 111 m/364 ft \rightarrow p. 35

A beacon of light at night

Lighthouses always seem to have a certain kind of appeal. Madeira's most attractive one stands at the tip of the Rocha da Vigia in *Ponta do Pargo*. Originally constructed in 1922, it lures visitors inside to see its photo exhibition depicting the other beacons of light around the island $\rightarrow p$. 55

A multi-purpose crop

At one time, sugar cane made the island's plantation owners rich. Today, there are only a few sugar cane mills still in use on Madeira. One of them is run by the *Sociedade dos Engenhos da Calheta*. In this mill, you can see how rum and honey are made – and give them both a try \rightarrow p. 52

Unique experiences

Colourful and varied delicacies

Flowers in glowing colours, exotic fruit, delicious vegetables and fresh fish – these are the treasures of Madeira. Sellers tastefully display their wares in the *Mercado dos Lavradores* in Funchal where you can try the best that the island has to offer. Friday is the liveliest market day (photo) \rightarrow p. 36

Island of eternal spring

In Funchal's Jardim Botânico you will quickly discover why Madeira is called the island of eternal spring. More than 2,500 tropical and subtropical plants present themselves in all shades of green → p. 46

Sleds without snow

Take one of the famous basket sleds on runners, propelled by the muscles of strong men, along the road from Monte down towards Funchal → p. 48

Along the levadas

Walk alongside ancient irrigation channels through woods of eucalyptus and laurel, past dizzying gorges or along broad forest tracks. You will never forget the paths on the *levadas* of Madeira, for example on the *Levada do Furado* \Rightarrow p. 73

Favourite local dishes: espada and espetada

Madeira's national dishes are truly delicious – try black scabbard fish with banana in the *Borda d'Agua* in Ribeira Brava. *Espetada*, juicy chunks of beef on a laurel-wood skewer, is served in traditional style at the *Portela à vista* on the Portela Pass \rightarrow p. 58. 78

Set sail on the Santa Maria de Colombo

Christopher Columbus lived on Madeira for a few years and planned his voyages here. On a replica of his ship, built true to the original, you can feel like an explorer yourself → p. 110

Pools made of volcanic rock

The surf crashes on the black rocks a few metres away while you take a relaxed swim in the natural *lava pools* in Porto Moniz. An extraordinary experience! → p. 62

IMPORTANT TIPS: The mountain road leading from Paul da Serra to the Encumeada Pass is sometimes closed in winter due to falling rocks or snowfall. If this road is closed, take ER209 from Paúl da Serra towards Canhas to return to the south coast. In general, be particularly careful when driving along Madeira's narrow coastal and mountain roads. It is often impossible to see oncoming traffic coming from a distance and good brakes are essential for the steep inclines.

COSTS: Car hire at least 30 euros/day, petrol approx. 50 euros,
