INSIDER TIP A quiet harbour tavern

Karaköy Lokantasi at the passenger ferry terminal is a good address: the food is tasty and plentiful, the atmosphere is quiet and laid back, and the prices are reasonable \rightarrow p. 71

INSIDER TIP Turkish pop and rock

Club Babylon (photo left) is a rendezvous for İstanbul's alternative music scene → p. 85

INSIDER TIP A shop for discerning punters



Discover new places and save money

Holy places of Islam

The *Eyüp Mosque* is a major place of pilgrimage, as the Prophet Mohammed's standard-bearer is buried here, and the site therefore attracts the faithful in great numbers. You can visit the mosque free of charge and get in tune with the respectful mood of the pilgrims \rightarrow p. 39

• A lively village by the sea

If you want to sit in comfort on the Bosphorus to enjoy the sunshine and all the goings-on around, you can go to one of the expensive restaurants by the shore. Or save money by taking a trip to *Ortaköy*. There is always something to watch here – from the concentrated backgammon players to the giant tankers on the water \rightarrow p. 57

• The seat of the Greek Orthodox patriarch

A good place to track down the spirit of old Byzantium: the *Church of the Patriarch* in Fener was closed to the public for many years. Now you can visit it free of charge \rightarrow **p. 97**

Is there an avant-garde artist in the house?

SALT is the place to go in İstanbul's art scene. Its varied exhibitions give visitors an opportunity to enter into a close dialogue with avant-garde works – free of charge, thanks to the generosity of wealthy sponsors \rightarrow p. 49

• In the sultan's garden

Follow in the sultan's footsteps in *Yıldız Park*. Ancient plane trees create an atmosphere of calm and provide shade. What was once the ruler's private park is now freely accessible to all (photo) \rightarrow p. 51

• Tour of the city by tram

A trip with a tour bus is not all that cheap. By contrast it costs practically nothing to travel round İstanbul by *tram*. The trip from Aksaray to Kabataş, through the old quarter and across the Golden Horn, will set you back just a couple of $TL \rightarrow p.39$

• A stroll through the bazaar

Shopping as in bygone days – at the *Grand Bazaar* you get to know the original oriental version of the shopping centre in its purest form, especially if you take a stroll through its lanes out of season \rightarrow p. 40

• A wonderful mosque

It is one of the largest and most beautiful places of worship in the entire Islamic world: the Sultan Ahmet Camii. Why is it known as the *Blue Mosque*? The question is answered when you enter and see the interior, lined with blue faience (photo) \rightarrow p. 30

Palace of tents

The *Topkapı Palace* is still a reminder of the way of life of the Turkish people before they arrived in Anatolia. The diverse pavilions that make up the sultan's palace give an impression of tents of stone, even if they are somewhat larger and more opulent than those of the sultan's ancestors \rightarrow **p. 34**

• A boulevard for pleasure and culture

Sooner or later every visitor to İstanbul ends up on *İstiklal Caddesi*. There is a palpable sense that this fine avenue in the in-district of Beyoğlu is the vibrant heart of the city. Cinemas, bars and culture – there is something here for every taste $\rightarrow p. 48$

Bridge between contrasts

The *Galata Bridge* across the Golden Horn is the symbolic centre of istanbul. Nowhere is the contrast of old and new, oriental and western, as apparent as here. And all the anglers are the clearest possible proof of the importance of the sea as the basis for the existence and life of the city \rightarrow **p. 40**

• Ferry across the Bosphorus

A boat ride across the Bosphorus is one of the most enjoyable experiences in İstanbul. Get aboard in Eminönü and savour the slow trip through the straits to the terminal. Then take ample refreshment in one of the fish restaurants before taking the ferry back. The excursion will give you completely new impressions of the city, and provide some memorable photos of your time in İstanbul $\rightarrow p. 56$ 2

THE PERFECT DAY

İstanbul in 24 hours

Get to know some of the most dazzling, exciting, and relaxing facets of İstanbul – all on a single day

08:30am BREAKFAST IN THE CITY CENTRE

Start the day with breakfast in the centre on *Taksim Square* \rightarrow p. 50 in the café *Gezi* \rightarrow p. 62. From here you have a great view of the modern city centre – and a first impression of İstanbul's buzz, and how hectic things are, too.

09:30am A LIVELY AVENUE

Fortified for the day ahead, take a trip on İstanbul's most interesting means of transport, the historic tram system, to ride along **istiklal Caddesi** → **p. 48** (photo left). This way you get to know the upper section of the famous old boulevard with its art galleries, bookshops, cinemas, cafés and shopping arcades. Alight at the Galatasaray Lycée and take a brief stroll through what used to be the flower arcade. The fish market of Beyoğlu will give you a taster of the atmosphere on istanbul's markets.

10:30am WALK BY THE WATER

From Galatasaray continue on foot along istiklal Caddesi to Tünel Square, and pay a visit here to the *Mevlevi Monastery* → p. 49, which was once the headquarters of the dancing dervishes in Istanbul. From the monastery a boulevard leads downhill directly to the *Galata Tower* → p. 46. The viewing terrace of the tower gives you a fantastic all-round view of the city centre. After that go down the hill until you are in Karaköy, the heart of the city, by the Golden Horn and the *Galata Bridge* → p. 40.

11:30am A MIDDAY TREAT

The bridge links modern Karaköy with the old quarter. Walking across is a bit like travelling back in time – a feeling that will get even stronger when you plunge into the bustle of the *Egyptian Bazaar* \rightarrow p. 38 on the other side. This oriental market is a feast for all the senses, as here you will see and smell all the spices you can imagine. Have a good look round to work up an appetite for lunch. *Pandeli* \rightarrow p. 65 above the entrance to the bazaar is just the job for a good midday meal.

02:00pm IMPRESSIVE MONUMENTS

On the hill above the spice bazaar stand the two buildings that every visitor to İstanbul has to see: Hagia Sophia \rightarrow p. 32 and the Blue Mosque \rightarrow p. 30. They are among the most impressive places of worship in the whole world. Take time to let these monumental works of architecture work their magic on you.

03:30pm IN THE SULTAN'S PALACE

Beyond Hagia Sophia lies the great gateway to the first courtyard of the *Topkapı Palace* \rightarrow p. 34 (photo centre), once the residence of the sultan. Explore the extensive palace grounds with their delicate architecture and learn about the long-gone days of the ruling family and their court. After this visit follow the signs to the *Archaeological Museum* \rightarrow p. 29 and take a break in their tea garden.

06:00pm ISTANBUL FROM THE WATER

Walk through Gülhane Park down to where the boats moor in Eminönü. Private ferry operators offer a two-hour round trip on the Bosphorus. In the light of the setting sun you will see *istanbul Modern* \rightarrow p. 48, istanbul's leading museum of art, and the *Dolmabahçe Palace* \rightarrow p. 46, before passing under the first Bosphorus bridge and returning to the pier.

08:30pm ROUND OFF THE DAY WITH A MEAL AND MUSIC

Cross the Galata Bridge to get back to Karaköy and take the city's oldest subway line, the *Tünel* funicular railway, back to Tünel Square. In the alleys opposite the exit there are dozens of bars, clubs and restaurants, for example *Yakup 2* \rightarrow p. 69. If you are still up for it after a meal, drop in at one of the music clubs such as the nearby *Babylon* \rightarrow p. 85 (photo right).
