Take the chance to try some unique argan oil, a local product made only in the region around Agadir from the fruit of the indigenous argan tree (photo right) → p.31

Discover new places and save money

Marabout in Sidi Kaouki

A marabout refers to the small domed shrine housing the grave of a saint which is always accessible and is said to possess special powers. Built right on the beach and lapped by the sea at high tide, the *Marabout Sidi Kaouki* in the village of the same name is particularly striking \rightarrow p. 47

Museum village of Ait Ben Haddou

An entire village for a film set and museum – and for free. Ait Ben Haddou is situated on a hillside near Ouarzazate at the edge of the High Atlas. It is a World Heritage Site and definitely worth seeing → p. 90

National Parks

Morocco has several national parks, and they are all freely accessible. Visitors can follow the set routes and paths and experience some of the great outdoors Morocco has to offer. The *Jbel Tazzeka* and *Oued Massa* are especially impressive \rightarrow p. 51, 76

Open-air theatre

The fishing harbour of Essaouira could hardly be more picturesquely situated. In the mornings it's fun to go and watch the *fish auctions*. They take place right at the quayside and are free for spectators \rightarrow p. 44

Artistic murals

Asilah is not a museum village and doesn't have an established art scene like the much more touristy Essaouira, but it's a small artistic centre nonetheless. Here though, works are exhibited not in galleries or museums but very openly as free-to-view murals on the façades of houses (photo) → p. 40

Acrobatics and snake charmers

Delve into the heart of Marrakech and be entertained like in One Thousand and One Nights: snake charmers, story-tellers, fire-eaters or acrobats all perform for free in the evenings on the *Jemaa el Fna* – just offer a small contribution to keep this spectacle going! \rightarrow p. 53

Unique experiences

Tajines by the roadside

Travellers can't fail to spot these unique clay pots with the cone-shaped lids, in which meat and vegetables stew. They tend to taste best where the locals sit down to eat, namely at the small and simple street cafés, such as in Kelaat M'Gouna → p. 92

Living in the kasbah

Time was when these imposing mud castles were falling into decay, because they didn't match the Moroccans' perception of modern living. Now, you can stay the night in them – authentic and in style! Especially recommended is the kasbah *Tomboctou* in Tinghir → p. 94



Tea time

Thé à la menthe – sweet mint tea – is Morocco's national drink. Preparing and serving it involves a certain ritual and etiquette. Having said that, in the *Maison Traditionelle* in Oumesnat the tea is served together with "Berber Nutella" (honey, almonds and argan oil) \rightarrow p. 81

Camels on the beach

Camel riding is great fun, but when you do it with a sea breeze in your hair it's even better! You can book rides and even safaris lasting several days at a number of places, including the *Ranch de Diabat* near Essaouira \rightarrow p. 45

Drums in the desert

Staying out in the desert is a unique experience. There is the unending vastness and the tranquillity, not to mention the cute camels. Tranquility? Hold on a minute! Things only get quiet here late at night, after the camel drivers have stopped beating their drums – that's desert music for you \Rightarrow p. 113

Gnaoua Festival

It only lasts a couple of days, but it's so colourful, noisy and exciting that many Europeans only travel to Morocco to attend the *Gnaoua Festival*. Each year in late June, the city of Essaouira is transformed into one enormous music venue as thousands of people make the pilgrimage here to chill out to the mystic melodies (photo) \rightarrow p. 121

IMPORTANT TIPS: In rural areas many of the roads are single track. Avoid driving at night as the roads are dimly lit, making it difficult to see pedestrians and animals. To help you find hotel accommodation in cities, it's worth taking a taxi which you can follow in the rental car (max. 50 dh).
