There are plenty of hotel blocks in Benidorm, but the friendly service offered here ensures that you will not feel like you are just a number: the Hotel El Palmeral is located just behind the Playa de Poniente → p. 64

The perfect mix of tradition and refinement delights the palates of the diners in the Casa del Mar restaurant in Águilas → p. 81

The very well-equipped Villas La Manga apartment hotel in La Manga del Mar Menor is ideal for families with children → p. 87

#### **INSIDER TIP** Stirred not shaken

The tiger-nut milk horchata served here is freshly prepared each day: in Horchatería El Siglo on the Plaça Santa Catalina, the town's lively inner-city square → p. 50

#### INSIDER TIP Flighty

Beware of low-flying birds when you visit the Jardín del Papagayo 'Parrot Garden' in Peñíscola. There are around five hundred of these colourfully feathered creatures there → p. 100

# PREE FREE

#### • The joys of the saddle

How about borrowing a bicycle free of charge? This is possible in Benicassim on the Costa del Azahar if you leave a deposit. The roads in the area have cycle lanes, and it is also the starting point for the short 'Green Route' to Oropesa del Mar  $\rightarrow$  p. 43

#### A concentrated dose of art

The high-quality exhibits in the *Museum of Fine Arts (Museu Belles Arts)* in Castelló de la Plana can be visited at no cost. The main focus is on Spanish artists, and the paintings of traditional scenes reveal a lot about the culture. Ceramics and archaeological finds complement the museum's collection  $\rightarrow$  p. 43

#### Monumental duo

There are two interesting sights you can visit in Novelda, and you do not have to pay for them: the small castle and the monastery of *Santa María Magdalena* with its elaborate decoration influenced by the Catalan form of Art Nouveau *Modernisme* (photo) → p. 77

#### View of the coast

Enjoy the free view of the Costa Cálida from the *lookout point (mirador)* in Mazarrón. The small eyrie is located between the Pava and Reya beaches  $\rightarrow$  p. 83

#### Free museums

Alacant makes it possible for visitors to go to some of its museums free of charge – these include the Museo de Belenes with its Christmas cribs and the Museo de Arte Contemporáneo with its collection of modern and contemporary art → p. 76

#### • Treasures from the sea

If you want to see all that has ended up on the ocean floor over the centuries, you should visit the *Museo Nacional de Arqueología* in Cartagena; there is no admission fee p. 88

## **ONLY ON THE COSTA BLANCA**

**Unique experiences** 

#### Famous rice dish

The entire region is regarded as the home of the paella and the restaurants compete to outdo each other and serve the best. You should always be able to recognise and taste the individual ingredients of a good paella, such as the vegetables, seafood and meat. The Restaurante Columbus in the old city in Cartagena is famous for this delicious dish → p. 93

#### Blazing fiesta fun

Fireworks and bangers are always part of the Fallas, a top event in March during Spain's annual fiestas. Artists give free rein to their sarcasm when they build their papier-mâché figures and display them on the streets and squares — especially in Valencia — until the 'Night of Fire' —> p. 53, 104

#### Decorative and tasty

The orange tree is a common sight in the region (photo). The delicious fruit ripens on countless plantations, and the northern part of the coast, the Costa del Azahar, is even named after the fragrant flowers: 'The Orange Blossom Coast'. You can stock up on fresh oranges at *Frutas Piñana* in Peñíscola → p. 40

#### Total work of art

The Old Town in Peñíscola is a total work of art typical of the cities in the region: a jumble of white houses, cosy restaurants and, at the top of the hill, a castle dating from the days of the Knights Templar  $\rightarrow p$ . 38

#### Commanding castles

Numerous watchtowers and castles, many dating back to the Moors, can be seen along the coast. In the Middle Ages, the fortresses fell into the hands of the Christians who adapted them for their purposes. One of the most impressive dominates the skyline over Alacant; the Castillo de Santa Bárbara  $\rightarrow$  p. 58

#### Beach giants

The magnificent sandy beaches are among the most valuable assets of the Spanish Mediterranean coast. Benidorm boasts two gigantic stretches of sand: the *Platja de Llevant* and *Platja de Ponent* → p. 63

## THE PERFECT ROUTE

Experience the diversity of the Costa Blanca from north to south and take a few brief detours to the left and right of the main route

#### **LEAD-UP TO THE COAST**

The route is conceived as a round trip from and to Valencia and invites motorists to discover all the coast and hinterland has to offer. The main focus is on the Costa Blanca. The starting point is the airport at 1 *Valencia*  $\rightarrow$  p. 44 where you collect the hired car that you booked in advance. You can put off visiting the city

itself until after you return. After you leave the airport, take the ring road to the south and drive on the motorway until you reach the exit to ② Dénia → p.69. You should plan to spend two nights here in what is one of the most delightful little towns on the Costa Blanca. The castle, the beaches and the marina in Dénia offer a fascinating cultural mix.

## ON THE PROMONTORY AND IN THE MOUNTAINS

Dénia is the ideal starting point for a full-day excursion to 3 Cap de la Nao  $\rightarrow$  p. 72 and 4 Calp  $\rightarrow$  p. 67 with its

beaches and the famous rocky landmark *Penyal*d'Ifac (photo right). The picturesque mountain village of **Guadalest p. 66**,

poetry in stone. despite the many visi-

tors, lies waiting for you near Calp.
Back in Dénia, you will still have time
to freshen up with a dip in the hotel pool
or the sea before you go to dinner. *Chimichurri* is

a popular restaurant at the marina specialising in tasty grilled food.

#### **OFF TO ALACANT!**

The next day, you can cover the stretch from Dénia to the port city of Alacant, which is better known under its Spanish name of Alicante, in one go unless you want to make a stopover in the lively holiday resort ③ Benidorm → p. 62. Instead of looking for rooms directly in the city of ③ Alacant → p. 56, it is better to spend the night away from the main centre near the beach area at Platja de Sant Joan. You must visit the castle, the Castillo de Santa Bárbara, in Alacant. Then you can set off to explore the old city and harbour area of Alacant — or just relax on the Platja de Sant Joan; tomorrow you have a long drive ahead of you to get know the southern section of

your destination: ③ La Manga del Mar Menor → p. 83 on the inland sea the Mar Menor 'Little Sea'. It is worth spending two nights there so that you have enough time to explore the ④ Cabo de Palos → p. 84 and make a short trip to ⑥ Cartagena → p. 87, the harbour town in the south-west.

## PALM GROVES, MOORS AND CHRISTIANS

The motorway makes it easy to get around quickly and you drive back over the AP7 to the north after you leave La Manga del Mar Menor and head for **10**Elx (Elche)  $\rightarrow$  p. 73, the city of palms. The highlight is a foray into the palm groves of the Huerto del Cura. Maybe you would like to spend the night here before driving north-east into the hinterland and making a stopover in **12** Alcoi (Alcoy)  $\rightarrow$  p. 64. You should visit the town's historical centre and admire the Art Nouveau architecture. Alcoi becomes really packed in April and May when it is invaded by hordes of



Moors and Christians for the *Moros y Cristianos* festival. The barren, mountainous surroundings of Alcoi give way to more fertile land farther to the north. The small mountain town of (1) *Xàtiva* (*Játiva*)  $\rightarrow$  p. 55 is a pleasant place to spend the last night of your road tour.

#### **THE METROPOLIS**

The A7 takes you from Xàtiva through a fertile, hill-lined valley full of orange groves back to the starting point in (1) Valencia (photo, far left). This marks the end of the 'Perfect Route'. It is not worth keeping the car in town. After returning it to the rental company, you should plan on spending at least two or three days in Valencia to experience all the charm and vitality of the city.
