

#### Spas for free

More than 100 thermal springs bubble forth on Ischia and thermal parks set in lush subtropical gardens guarantee spa and bathing pleasures. Enjoy the hot thermal waters that bubble up in the sea at *Sorgeto Bay* entirely for free → p. 65

#### Caravaggio's gift to you

In the heart of Naples is Caravaggio's famous *altarpiece* – still in the place for which it was originally intended – in the Chiesa Pio Monte della Misericordia and naturally there is no charge to view it  $\rightarrow$  p. 39

#### New Year's party at the Piazza Plebiscito

The expansive *Piazza Plebiscito* – the city's popular gathering spot – transforms during New Year into an outdoor stage with the hippest bands and at midnight there is a massive fireworks display  $\rightarrow$  p. 39

#### Wackv art

Internationally renowned artists and architects have designed the *Metro line 1* stations in Naples, and sometimes even the nearby squares. Get art for free when you buy your Metro ticket!  $\rightarrow$  p. 47

#### Oasis of calm

In the Via San Gregorio Armeno lies the entrance to one of the most peaceful places in the *centro storico*: the *San Gregorio Armeno* cloister. You need only ring the bell to be let in (photo)  $\rightarrow$  p. 47

#### A view for millionaires

Where the ancient Romans built their villas – overlooking the sea in Sorrento – today there are luxury hotels. You can enjoy the same (free) panorama from the *Villa Comunale* public park → p. 79

#### Travel back in time in Cilento

Roscigno Vecchia had to be evacuated in the beginning of the 20th century due to a landslide. The ghost town is now a free open air museum and a '19th century Pompeii' that is an interesting excursion → p. 102

## **ONLY IN CAMPANIA**

Unique experiences

#### Pizza Nazionale

Real pizza, *la vera pizza*, is only available at its place of origin, right here in Napoli. For connoisseurs, only the original *Marinara* (tomatoes, garlic, oregano) and *Margherita* in the national colours (red, white, green: tomatoes, mozzarella, basil) count—and that is exactly what *Da Michele* serves  $\Rightarrow$  **p.** 41

#### Gelato al Limone

This area is famed for its lemons and tempts with its Limoncello (photo), freshly squeezed lemonade *spremuta di limone* or the creamy *delizia al limone* dessert. Enjoy the refreshing and delicious *gelato al limone* in the eponymous ice cream parlour in Capri!  $\rightarrow$  p. 61

#### Endless views

Panoramic views are always worth the effort. On the high hiking trail Sentiero degli Dei you are rewarded with magnificent views all the way from Capri to Cilento → p. 71

#### Pastry poetry

Naples' most famous pastry is the *sfogliatella*: crisp puff pastry on the outside and inside a warm, fragrant ricotta flavoured with candied orange peel. Especially good at *Scaturchio* → p. 41

#### Musica Napoletana

Naples is music. Be it the sound of Homer's sirens, lyric villanelles that have been around since 16th century, traditional *Canzone Napoletana* (such as 'O sole mio'), the blues by Pino Daniele, jazz à la James Senese or reggae rhythms by Almamegretta. Always and everywhere, thanks to the *Radio Partenope* app → p. 114

#### Heat beneath your feet

The Gulf of Naples is a volcanically active region, and Mount Vesuvius is only lying dormant. You can get very close (and still stay safe) to earth's mighty forces at the *Solfatara* crater in Pozzuoli  $\rightarrow$  p. 45

#### Hip hostels

You can find good accommodation on the Gulf of Naples even on a tight budget. There are a number of inexpensive and trendy hostels such as the *Fabric Hostel & Club* in Portici at Ercolano (Herculaneum). Also a hot nightlife tip!  $\rightarrow$  p. 53



# THE PERFECT ROUTE

Experience the diverse facets of Campania from the north to the south – with detours to the island of Procida and to Mount Vesuvius

## **GET AWAY FROM IT ALL**

1 Naples → p. 32 and surroundings are best discovered by public transport. After 2 Pozzuoli → p. 45 you can change to the suburban Cumana line or the Metro. Fresh fish straight from the fishing boats is available every morning (except Mon) at the harbour market. The short ferry trip to the charming island of 3 Procida → p. 64 (photo left) is a mini-cruise at a budget price. This is where the Neapolitans

escape to when they want to avoid the Capri and Ischia tourists.

**VIEW FROM THE VOLCANO** 

Take the ferry back to Naples and then drive south along the Via Reggia di Portici, make a stop in at the ancient Roman town of 

1 Herculaneum → p. 50. The site is a lot less visited than Pompeii and far better preserved, it is practically set in stone from the lava flow from 

1 Mount Vesuvius → p. 56. The scenic road to the volcano goes up 1000m/3280ft; continue on foot to the rim of the crater where there is a panoramic view of the Gulf. You hardly ever get a chance to view it alone – so don't get your hopes up.

## **DIVINE COAST**

The SS 145 motorway that leads from Castellamare di Stabia to ⑤ *Sorrento* → p. 79 winds along the coast and has lovely sea views. The road snakes its way past lemon and olive groves via Massa Lubrense to Termini. Hikers will enjoy the marine sanctuary, ⑦ *Punta Campanella* → p. 82 with the best views of Capri. A road ends at the Marina del Cantone – a picturesque seaside resort that seems straight from the 1950s. It is an adventure for both drivers and photographers to wind along the stunning SS 163 Amalfi coastal road to ⑥ *Sant'Agata sui due Golfi* → p. 83. A photo stop just before ⑨ *Positano* → p. 73 (photo right) is a must. Praiano, Amalfi, Atrani and Cetara – each coastal town more beautiful than the next but unfortunately

parking is scarce everywhere. The 30km/18mi long Costa

Divina road ends in  $\bigcirc$  Vietri sul Mare  $\rightarrow$  p. 72, a good place

THE FUTURE AND THE PAST

to take a stroll and shop for ceramics.

The neighbouring town of ① *Salemo* → p. 78 is on the upswing and the well-preserved historic old town which dates to the Middle Ages sits comfortably in the 21st century. If you are already missing the Amalfitana, you can head back but for everyone else, it is on the Strada Litoranea to the Cilento nature



reserve where you can visit the remains of Paestum > p. 92, with its Greek temples. A great place to take a break and to enjoy some of the best buffalo mozzarella!

## **BETWEEN THE MOUNTAINS AND THE SEA**

South of Agropoli the olive grove hills stretch all the way to the sea, interrupted by sandy coves, such as at  $^{13}$  Santa Maria di Castellabate  $\rightarrow$  p. 86. The drive along the coastal road goes via Acciaroli, Pioppi, Ascea to  $^{14}$  Pisciotta  $\rightarrow$  p. 97 and Facilla Commy. But paradise can also be found east of  $^{13}$  Marina di Camerota  $\rightarrow$  p. 90: the wildly romantic Costa degli Infreschi is best explored twice – once on foot and ance by best and don't forget to have a

once by boat and don't forget to have a swim!

Afterwards the route snakes up to Lentiscosa and further along the foot of the Monte Bulgheria. Just before San Giovanni a Piro it is worth taking a detour by car to Ciolandrea belvedere with its panoramic views, you may want to go for a hike around here, before the perfect route ends later in style at the seaside hamlet of ⑤ Scario → p. 91.
