Discover new places and save money

#### Salmon viewing in Vancouver

Instead of going to an aquarium, you can see wild salmon up close and for free at the *Capilano Salmon Hatchery* in the summer. Watch the fish fight against the flow through large underwater observation windows  $\rightarrow$  p. 34

#### Gold rush town

Historic *Dawson City* could almost be a museum village, but the authentic gold rush town established in 1898 is alive and kicking and offers wonderful photo opportunities and plenty of pioneer flair (photo) without any entrance fee  $\rightarrow$  p. 95

#### Sunny mountains, dizzying heights

National parks charge admission but provincial parks in Alberta, such as *Kananaskis Country*, are free. The Rocky Mountains here are just as beautiful as in Banff – but much sunnier, because it is the eastern flank of the mountains → p. 77

#### The sound of the mountains

Enjoy jazz, classical music, dance and even operas – for free or only little money – throughout the summer at the prestigious *Banff Centre*. All in front of the magnificent mountain scenery of Banff Nation → p. 89

#### Enjoyment of art for free

'Art for all' is the motto of the *Vancouver Art Gallery* every Tuesday evening, when admission is free. Those who want to can leave a donation. Worth seeing: Emily Carr's impressionistic and expansive paintings of the rugged west coast → p. 38

#### Cliff hiking

Landscaped and paved trails are few and far between on the west coast — and they usually cost money such as in the Pacific Rim National Park. The Wild Pacific Trail right next door in Ucluelet is free and truly stunning. Start with the Lighthouse Loop section! → p. 44

Unique experiences

#### Celebrate with lumberjacks

It doesn't get more Canadian than the Salmon Festival in Campbell River on Vancouver Island where salmon and lumberjacks are celebrated – with axe throwing and bowsaw competitions → p. 127

#### Across the Arctic Circle

The trip on Canada's northernmost road takes two days: the  $700 \, \text{km}/435 \, \text{mi}$  Dempster Highway runs through the wilderness from Dawson City across the Arctic Circle through the Mackenzie Delta  $\rightarrow$  p. 97

#### Orca watching

It is a strict rule that no one is allowed to get closer than 100 m/300 ft from the whales. But the inquisitive creatures often come closer to the boats and you may experience this on a whale watching tour in Victoria with Eagle Wing Tours → p. 48

#### Smoked salmon in Vancouver

At the Granville Island *Public Market* in Vancouver you can sample the culinary treasures of Canada's west coast: raspberries, goat's cheese, oysters, halibut – and the best smoked salmon in the world  $\rightarrow$  p. 35

#### Trapper for a day

How about spending the night as a fur trapper? Deep in the wilderness of British Columbia the wooden stockades and beaver pelts of the *Fort St. James National Historic Site* take you back to the era of the fur trader  $\rightarrow p$ , 64

#### Cycling around Stanley Park

On a sunny afternoon, there is no better outing in Vancouver than the more than 10 km/6 mi long *Stanley Park Drive*. The route winds its way along the coast with great views of the city, the mountains, the fjords and small beaches  $\rightarrow$  p. 36

#### Lake views in the Rocky Mountains

The view from *Bow Summit Pass* − 2000 m/6560 ft and sometimes windy − over Peyto Lake is quite stunning. The strikingly turquoise glacial lake is one of the most impressive sights in the Rockies (photo) → p.69
