Purchase the *Malta Discount Card* for 20 euros and your accompanying guest can eat for free in many restaurants on Malta and Gozo. If you're travelling alone, you get 50% off the food bill. The discount card is available in every tourist information centre \rightarrow p. 124

Malta and allows time for short walks as you steer towards the most beautiful prehistoric temples, churches with gigantic impressive cupolas and grottos along the cliffs and sandy beaches.
