
#### Donut delight

08:00am Thanks to the time change, you will probably be starving when you wake up on your first morning in New York. At  $\bigcirc$  Eisenberg's  $\rightarrow$  p. 62 – a traditional diner in Chelsea (subway N, R 23 Street) - eggs and different kinds of toast are made to order. If you sit at the counter, you can watch how fast the cooks and waitstaff work.
