INSIDER TIP ▶ William Turner likes it gloomy

The *National Gallery* only exhibits some of the artist's watercolours in the weak January light to prevent them from fading → p. 46

INSIDER TIP ▶ Pandas and penguins

Besides the daily penguin parade in *Edinburgh Zoo* (photo above), there's one more highlight: giant pandas → p. 94

INSIDER TIP ▶ Cryptic crypt

Non-stop horror films, pole dancing, cosy corners and "candlelight burgers" in the gloomy *Banshee Labyrinth* under a bridge in the Old Town → p. 69

INSIDER TIP ▶ Seaweed brew

You will be able to try a drink you have definitely never had before at the *David Bann* vegetarian restaurant: beer made of seaweed → p. 55

INSIDER TIP ▶ A hat for every head

Perhaps a Sherlock Holmes-style deerstalker for his lordship and surely nothing but a fascinator will do for her ladyship – a hatter and her universe rule in *Fabhatrix* in the heart of Old Town → p. 62

You will get the best photo of the castle from *St Cuthbert's Cemetery* at the foot of the hill. It is particularly beautiful in winter when leaves do not block your view → p. 45

Unique experiences

● *The castle on the volcano*

The most impressive aspect of *Edinburgh Castle* and the volcanic rock it is built on is the silhouette the two merge to form. The crown jewels and the Stone of Destiny in the castle are true gems. The views are breathtaking! → p. 30

● *Memento mori*

The gloomy *Greyfriars Cemetery* in the heart of the Old Town is like a history book of the city carved in stone. A lot of people come here because they believe the place is haunted. The corpse thieves Burke and Hare dug up bodies buried here for an anatomy professor → p. 32

● *Fiddles in the bar*

Sandy Bell's is a pub with a resounding reputation. There is nothing more typically Scottish than listening to folk musicians at a jam session with a glass of beer in your hand → p. 72

● *Eating in the heart of the city*

You will feel like you are in a catacomb in the vaults of *The Grain Store* restaurant. Tuck into the unpretentious food served by candlelight in what was once a warehouse → p. 57

● *Just a department store?*

Jenners, from 1838, does not try to be modern. Here a small escalator, there a narrow, winding staircase. You can never be quite sure which of the 100 departments on the six floors you will find yourself in – but Jenners sells absolutely everything (photo) → p. 61

● *Farmer's market with a view of the castle*

The best market in the country is quite simply named *Farmer's Market*. Sixty farmers and producers offer their exquisite, out of the ordinary produce for sale on Saturday: wild boar, organic beer, ostrich and water-buffalo meat, lobster, honey, chutneys ... → p. 64

● *Royal-tea!*

You too can extend your little finger while sipping at a cup of tea in these hallowed halls. According to King George IV, the famous *Signet Library* was the finest of Britain's assembly rooms. Time for high tea! → p. 51
